

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PIPELINE

As of April 1, 2024, CenterState CEO is tracking a significant level of investment interest in the region that includes:



Those projects include 39 attraction prospects and 51 retention/expansion opportunities. Within the pipeline, the **advanced manufacturing sector** makes up 75% of projects, a 56% increase since Q1 2023 and a reflection of the tremendous growth in Central New York within that sector.

Additionally, CEO is tracking a significant pipeline of housing related projects that includes an estimated **\$3 billion** in capital investments proposed to develop more than **9,000 units**. Community Investment

CenterState CEO's community investment work spans all facets of its economic development efforts, bringing together critical elements of inclusive growth: people, place and business. It strives to ensure business development services benefit small, "main street" businesses and historically underserved communities, particularly within distressed neighborhoods where empty storefronts, a lack of goods and services, and the long-term impacts of systemic disinvestment have driven cycles of decline for vulnerable residents.

In the past year, CenterState CEO has begun to actively track more projects within the economic development pipeline to comprehensively include attraction prospects, foreign direct investment and urban mixed-use redevelopment, as well as small main street businesses, growth in companies within its accelerator programs, and more.



Sarah Ausby, owner of Ma's Wings & Things, has made an amazing journey from homelessness to starting a thriving food business. Sarah officially launched after completing CenterState CEO's Start It for Food Businesses training course. She then moved into the Up Start technical assistance program to receive help accessing necessary resources to move her business forward. Sarah has also been able to secure a grant through her work with CenterState CEO.

INCLUSIVE GROWTH (cont.)

WORKFORCE INNOVATION

CenterState CEO is focused on helping workers access career opportunities and building wealth through family sustaining employment, and helping employers succeed by connecting them to talent and supporting their talent development and retention strategies. Through collaborative partnerships, it is establishing best practices and building capacity in workforce-related systems to drive long term change.

In the newest Syracuse Surge workforce program, Surge Defense, more than **61% of participants** secured a union job after completing the program, with more undergoing the application process. Read more about Surge Defense and other Syracuse Surge workforce initiatives on page 18.

CENTERSTATE CEO EXPERTISE TAPPED FOR STATEWIDE ON-RAMP INITIATIVE

New York State has tapped CenterState CEO to lead the planning and design of the One Network for Advanced Manufacturing Partnerships (ON-RAMP) center in Syracuse, which is part of a new statewide workforce development initiative announced by New York State Governor Kathy Hochul in early 2024. ON-RAMP's flagship location in Syracuse will become a prominent workforce resource for job seekers and employers alike.

The center will be in the heart of Syracuse (exact location to be determined) and will serve as a beacon for local residents, especially within underrepresented communities, to access career opportunities in our most rapidly growing sectors. It will also engage manufacturing and construction employers (and unions) to help them recruit talent and inform training programs, while creating visibility for their companies. It will also serve as a platform for collaboration and coordination among training and community partners to scale the proven success of local collaborative workforce development.

The proposal was informed, in part, by CenterState CEO's work with NYS Empire State Development on the federal Tech Hubs program, Syracuse Surge and Syracuse Build initiatives, and the Future Ready Workforce Innovation Consortium. Since Gov. Hochul announced the ON-RAMP initiative, CenterState CEO has helped to convene a leadership team to guide the project. It has also secured a consultant to help the group of partners facilitate and create a plan.

The future Syracuse ON-RAMP center stands to play an important role in meeting demand for these two rapidly growing industries through a placed-based approach focused on developing "hidden talent" from underrepresented communitiessending a strong message that the jobs and opportunities on the horizon for the region are for everyone. This holistic approach aims to better leverage and align existing resources, as well as recruit and support prospective workers in a way that leads to higher rates of program completion and job placement within existing programs. INNOVATION & ENTREPRENEURSHIP

CenterState CEO helps entrepreneurs access programs, resources, funding, space and mentorship needed to start and grow successful businesses. Its dedicated business incubator, The Tech Garden, supports entrepreneurs and innovators at any stage of the business life cycle to help ensure the best chance for success.

As a convener for the entrepreneurial community, the Inclusive Growth team strives for increased equity and inclusion within the innovation ecosystem through programs and resources to meet each entrepreneur where they are in their startup journey, regardless of industry. CenterState CEO's technical assistance programs include: The Tech Garden (tenancy), The Clean Tech Center, Innovation Hot Spot, Up Start, Start It!, UAS Job Fund and the Growth + Equity Fund.

INNOVATION HOT SPOT

Provides five years of corporate, personal income and sales tax incentives to qualifying companies, which receive entrepreneurial services through The Tech Garden as the regional Innovation Hot Spot, or through incubator partners, to help companies grow in Central New York. Learn more.



Innovation Hot Spot company Eco-Baggeez produces resealable sandwich bags made of sustainable, biodegradable compostable and recyclable paper. Eco-Baggeez are locally produced at the Alternative Industries through The Arc of Madison Cortland in Oneida, New York, contributing to the success of people with developmental disabilities. The company recently acquired an account with Wegmans Food Markets, and is in 80 of its 110 stores as of early 2024.

RACIAL EQUITY & SOCIAL IMPACT

The <u>Racial Equity and Social Impact</u> (RESI) team works to ensure CenterState CEO's internal processes and external programs reflect the organization's value of inclusiveness. It leads its race and equity work, including diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) services, for its staff, membership and beyond.

DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION TRAINING

A suite of customized training services provides clients tools to advance DEI work within their organizations and workplaces, from the C-Suite to all levels of the employee spectrum.

Client Spotlight: Healthy Alliance & United Way of the Greater Capital Region

The RESI team was brought on by Healthy Alliance and the United Way of the Capital Region to support its Changemaker leadership cohort, eight BIPOC-led community organizations, through a **year-long DEI training** in 2023. Workshops and networking sessions throughout the year focused on the challenges in serving as agents of change and brainstorming solutions to impact broader systems change.

Participants' conversations centered around the power of intention and the roles of each Changemaker's organization in advancing DEI work. They also explored deeper understandings of their own personal development and growth, as well as how they manage others. Feedback received from participants is being incorporated into future RESI programming.

Client Spotlight: New York State Community Action Association, Inc.

The New York State Community Action Association, Inc. (NYSCAA) engaged the CenterState CEO RESI team for a Racial Dialogue session in 2023. Nearly 50 people participated in two-hour sessions designed to engage staff at all levels around the issues of race and equity. The goal was to support staff while balancing the organization's social responsibilities to the community. Participants had the opportunity to identify their concerns and barriers to understanding race-focused issues and events, the reality and legacy of race/racism across systems, and the impact of remaining silent in the workplace. The sessions provide a safe space to share dialogue, facilitated by experienced trainers to guide participants through the sessions. After completing the Racial Dialogue, NYSCAA participants were asked to share something they learned, and how they will use the information moving forward.

"This presentation was incredibly empowering and energizing. I will be taking the information Dr. Rogers discussed back to my agency's Social Justice Committee." "I learned about the importance of creating a safe space to share both the qualitative and quantitative data. DEI work is not easy but there are opportunities to do it across all aspects, sometimes more than just at work, but also in our community. We can start small and work our way up. Conversations are important."

TALENT STRATEGIES



In partnership with Advance Media New York, CenterState CEO launched This Is CNY in November 2023. The website is an information hub that highlights the quality of life in Central New York and can be a tool to attract needed talent to the region. Visitors can search job openings across the region and join the talent network for free to post a resume and connect with hiring managers.

Bringing and Keeping Talent in Central New York

CenterState CEO members have long shared that talent attraction and retention is an ongoing priority and challenge. Now that the region is on a path to new growth, the need to attract and retain talent is even more imperative, and therefore remains an ongoing priority for CenterState CEO as it leads strategy discussions and examines creative solutions with its members.

BOARD RETREAT PRIORITY: TALENT ATTRACTION

CenterState CEO underwent a board retreat process in 2023-24 with the theme: **Meeting the Moment: Building a Dynamic, Resilient and Equitable CNY Economy.** Board members joined several work groups with focus areas vital to Central New York's long-term success, such as talent attraction, and were tasked with identifying priorities and developing strategy recommendations. Following the retreat, the Talent Attraction Work Group returned this strategy:

Strategy: Unify and Expand Attraction and Soft-Landing Services

- Better align and integrate all existing talent attraction programming and initiatives under one coordinated approach (This is CNY, Generation Next, etc.).
- Improve messaging and in-region marketing on This is CNY.
- Expand wrap-around programming and attraction support.
- Create a resume bank program fed by regional HR leads.
- Establish in-person attraction efforts in targeted priority markets and in places with job contractions.
- Improve attraction one-on-one support for users of talent network.
- Expand Network with a Purpose and Generation Next programming. The group also recommended conducting additional market research on underlying issues impacting internship retention and explore potential for a CNY-only employer job fair.

CONCIERGE SERVICE & DUAL-CAREER FAMILY SERVICES

Among initiatives aimed at addressing common talent challenges identified by members, CenterState CEO created services to meet the needs of employers that are recruiting candidates who often have spouses, partners and family members also in need of employment.

Through its fee-based **concierge service**, CenterState CEO helps individuals or families moving to Central New York connect to places to live, health care or other services, and familiarize them with the exceptional assets that Central New York has to offer. These services are designed to acclimate a job candidate and their family to life in Central New York. Services can be offered pre- or post-hire.

Additionally, through its **dual-career family services**, CenterState CEO uses its network to introduce a candidate's spouse or partner to employers in need of their skills, and can make "warm contacts" with its network of 1,500 members and business connections, to help facilitate interviews for members of candidates' families.

The Career Apprenticeship Initiative - in partnership with the Kingston Economic Development Corporation, SUNY Oswego, Le Moyne College, Syracuse University and the Canadian Career Apprenticeship Initiative - aims to retain more of the Central New York region's college-educated talent. The pilot program offered liberal arts graduates a one-year apprenticeship with regional employers, who receive a \$5,000 salary reimbursement for agreeing to hire and train the student for a year. Ten CenterState CEO members agreed to provide entry level jobs, including: American Food & Vending, Brown & Brown, Community Bank, Crouse Health, Environmental Design and Research, Excellus, Lotte Biologics, Research and Marketing Strategies, Syracuse Housing Authority and SUNY Upstate Medical University. CenterState CEO Breaks Ground on New Hub of Innovation

The 46,000 square foot, \$32 million expansion of CenterState CEO's The Tech Garden officially broke ground in August 2023. **Expanding CenterState CEO's business incubator facility will enable Syracuse to meet the pace of its rapid tech industry growth while reimagining who is served by the facility and how.** The expansion will create space for 35 additional resident startups and serve 100 more members. Additional programing will broaden the reach and impact to drive more equity and inclusivity in the entrepreneurial ecosystem.

Once a collapsed parking garage, The Tech Garden is now an integral part of Central New York's growing innovation and startup economy. It is a NYS Certified Innovation Hot Spot and is the key tech business incubator for the Central New York region.

Among partners showing their support for the project, Northland Communications became the exclusive connectivity provider of dedicated internet for the incubator and is the naming sponsor of its plaza-level theater. Now known as the Northland Communications Theater, it is the first newly named space within the facility and is a critical feature for engaging tenants and other external stakeholders. The theater space has been a hub for networking, learning and entrepreneurial activity for the regional startup community for more than 15 years.

"Being a good neighbor and an engaged community member is integral to Northland's core values," said Jim McCarthy, president of Northland Communications. "We're excited about the expansion and its potential to become an even more vibrant hub for innovation. By offering a platform for startups and entrepreneurs to thrive, we're not only shaping the future but also contributing to the prosperity of the regions we serve. Partnering with CenterState CEO has allowed us to strengthen the technological ecosystem, support local talent, and create a positive impact that resonates with the community."

The new facility is expected to open in 2025.

CenterState CEO identifies the challenges small business owners face and develops programs and partnerships that provide resources to help entrepreneurs grow. Resources are focused on assisting entrepreneurs in the areas of:

management, legal, financial, marketing, funding and real estate.

UP START

Despite financing options that exist through banks and community development financial institutions, various structural and regulatory barriers still prevent many business owners and property developers from accessing capital. The Growth + Equity Fund (G+E Fund) was developed by CenterState CEO to address a spectrum of market inefficiencies and inequities by helping finance innovators, entrepreneurs and business owners who have traditionally struggled to access the funding needed to achieve their goals.





This past year, the regional banking community made a series of investments through CenterState CEO Foundation that will help sustain and grow its small business development programming. Commitments from KeyBank, Community Bank and Visions FCU will assist entrepreneurs from historically marginalized communities through CenterState CEO's Up Start program and Growth + Equity Fund. Syracuse, Rochester, Buffalo and Ithaca Form Federally Recognized Tech Hub





A consortium of partners from Syracuse, Rochester, Buffalo and Ithaca earned a federal Tech Hub designation as the New York Semiconductor Manufacturing and Research Technology Innovation Corridor (NY SMART-I Corridor) in 2023. The U.S. Economic Development Administration made just 31 Tech Hub designations across the country. Alongside our partners, the region is now competing for up to \$75 million in federal funding to support workforce development, innovation and supply chain activities in the semiconductor and related smart systems industry.

As the organization that submitted the designation application, **CenterState CEO partnered to lead the crafting of a compelling regional narrative that communicated the combined strength of all our partners' assets.** Application lead partners included the Buffalo Niagara Partnership in Buffalo, ROC2025 in Rochester and CenterState CEO in Syracuse.

"The Buffalo, Rochester and Syracuse SMART I-Corridor region has a generational opportunity to build a globally leading semiconductor cluster, as one in four American-made chips will be produced within 350 miles of the I-Corridor by 2033," said Rob Simpson, president of CenterState CEO. "No other area will account for a greater share of domestic production, which represents a critical capacity building opportunity for the region. To meet this moment, leading civic institutions across our region have partnered to co-design solutions that will catalyze efforts through five component projects. This proposal when executed will transform our economic competitiveness for generations while also impacting more immediate national security challenges. This corridor is poised and ready to lead, and we thank Senator Schumer for sharing our vision and providing unwavering support for this application."

Proposals for all five component projects were submitted to the federal government by NY SMART I-Corridor consortium members at the end of February. Funding decisions are expected to be announced this summer.

STEP (Semiconductor Talent & Employer Partnership): A unified front-door for employers to access semiconductor talent.

NY SMART I-Corridor C3 (Commercialization & Collaboration Center): An innovation one-stop-shop to assist businesses bringing new semiconductor technologies to market.

SCALE (SemiConductor Advancement, Leadership, and Entrepreneurship): Initiative: A shared venture studio to attract capital to the semiconductor entrepreneurship ecosystem.

SCAN (Supply Chain Activation Network): A supply chain network that expands capacity of existing and potential suppliers through scaling manufacturing support.

SMART I-Corridor Innovation Office: A governance structure to connect and coordinate across the I-Corridor region.

CEO IN ACTION:TTM Technologies Expands in CNY





TTM Technologies, a leading global manufacturer of technology solutions, intends to invest up to \$130 million to build a greenfield, high-tech manufacturing facility in DeWitt. The project is expected to bring an estimated 400 new jobs to the area and further enhance Central New York's current smart systems supply chain. The company identified a 24-acre property adjacent to its existing facility in DeWitt for the expansion. The increased campus size will also allow for additional expansion capacity already being considered for future phases of development.

TTM selected the Syracuse region for this significant expansion and investment after a competitive site selection process that involved 16 states. CenterState CEO worked for nearly two years with TTM's executives and consultants to make a strong case for their project to be located in Central New York. CenterState CEO partnered closely with Empire State Development, Senator Schumer's office and Onondaga County on the successful attraction effort.

TTM will build ultra-high density interconnect printed circuit boards in Central New York, which are crucial to the U.S. semiconductor industry, and important to addressing the rapidly increasing U.S. Defense demand for capability and capacity in the United States. It will be one of the largest manufacturing sites in North America for this technology. TTM's expansion and growth further solidifies Central New York as a hub for a trusted and resilient national microelectronic supply chain. This investment builds on the recent federal Tech Hubs and Defense Manufacturing Community designations, and Micron Technology's ongoing work in Clay.

Now a CenterState CEO Legacy Investor, TTM is committed to being an agent of change and a force for positive outcomes for Central New York.

Syracuse Surge Workforce Creates New Career Paths

In fall 2023, **34 people completed Syracuse Surge Workforce** programming. Candidates graduated from one of three programs: Surge Advanced Manufacturing (SAM) hosted by SUNY EOC, Electrical Mechanical Technician (ELM) hosted by OCC and OCM BOCES, or Surge Defense hosted by SUNY EOC. The programs align employers and training providers to prepare a local workforce with tech skills for today's economy. SAM and ELM are both multi-week, paid programs providing entry and mid-skill training for advanced manufacturing. This was the first class for Surge Defense, a paid, 13-week program that prepares people for careers in clean, high-tech assembly jobs in government contracting facilities.

SURGE DEFENSE

Surge Defense directly addresses the hiring challenges faced by the community's defense manufacturers and the high barriers to employment in defense manufacturing, such as undergoing a federal background check and inadequate public transportation access to facilities. Employer partner Lockheed Martin worked with SUNY EOC to design a training curriculum that aligned with the company needs.

Lockheed Martin also modified its internal practices, adjusting job requirements after a skill analysis of its positions and expanding its recruiting pools. Lockheed Martin recognized that the talent market will not correct itself. By acknowledging the present problems and putting in the work to find a solution, Lockheed Martin was able to expand its talent pipeline.

Its commitment to making the defense manufacturing industry more accessible helps it fill open positions it needs to grow. It also makes these careers more attainable to all members of the Syracuse community.

"Syracuse Surge's commitment to excellence and opportunity has been a guiding light for many of us, proving that education is not a privilege reserved for a select few but a right that should be accessible to all," said Miquel Velez, a Surge Defense graduate. "The journey doesn't end here. Armed with the knowledge and skills acquired through Syracuse Surge, we are now prepared to face challenges of the professional world. Let our journey inspire hope and may our success be a testament to the transformational power of education."

The first Surge Defense class included 13 graduates. The first group of graduates began working at Lockheed Martin in Jan. 2024. Others are working through the application process to hopefully take a position later this year.



Syracuse Surge Accelerator Empowers BIPOC Entrepreneurs

CenterState CEO launched the Syracuse Surge Accelerator in 2023, a new program that addresses the lack of diversity in the technology industry and helps strengthen a city-wide, collaborative effort to make Syracuse America's Smartest City. The program empowers Black-Indigenous-Persons of Color (BIPOC) entrepreneurs to launch and accelerate new or existing tech-related startups within the city of Syracuse.

Five startups began the 12-month accelerator in August: Sign-Speak, Talkadot, Clutch Delivery, HippoH Apparel, and Certainty Labs. All five finalists are from upstate New York. Surge Accelerator Program Director Dr. Emad Rahim said the group's sharing of personal experiences has been important and informative in driving change.

"Their vulnerability led to some breakthrough understandings about discrimination, ageism, and sexism as it relates to lending practices by investors, issues in securing partnerships and contracts with companies and government agencies, and obstacles in attracting more diverse talent outside of their current networks. These important conversations will help us shape our programs and influence who we welcome to facilitate our mastermind sessions and workshops," Dr. Rahim said.

Surge Accelerator teams participate in workshops with topics and speakers focused on the unique needs and challenges faced by BIPOC startup founders, and mastermind sessions designed to connect them with minority thought leaders from different business industries.

The programs key features include:

- Culturally competent programming and support to grow social capital.
- Access to capital through monthly living stipends and mini-ignition grants.
- Intensive supports and training.
- Customer discovery and market development.

Redeveloping Syracuse's Chimes Building with a Focus on Community

Redevelopment of 500 South Salina Street, also known as the Chimes Building, is the latest investment in downtown Syracuse's southwestern corridor. Led by the Allyn Family Foundation with collaborators like CenterState CEO, this is a chance to expand a vision of benevolent commercial real estate development and long-term community prosperity.

To accomplish this, a new not-for-profit, SEED Syracuse, Inc., was formed in 2023. SEED Syracuse, Inc. acts as a stabilizing force in neighborhoods by developing mixed-use, mixed-income properties on critical commercial corridors in areas in need of renewal and rehabilitation, thereby directly preventing further deterioration. Stabilizing and redeveloping deteriorating properties in distressed neighborhoods is critical to reducing disinvestment, catalyzing other redevelopment, and improving the quality of life for residents and locally-owned businesses.

This approach differs from traditional real estate development in that the vision is longer and broader. The Allyn Family Foundation is investing in the building and community upfront, believing that even if the profit doesn't return in five or 10 years, it will in 20, along with a more vibrant downtown.

As a project collaborator, CenterState CEO is assisting with project management and business development in the building's future commercial space. The first-floor commercial space will be redeveloped to enhance the streetscape and bring new business to the intersection. The businesses to fill those spaces will ideally be ones that add goods or services that are currently absent downtown. Above the commercial space, the building will be redeveloped into mixed-income housing, with a planned 152 units.

In addition, the Chimes project team includes two "Developers-in-Residence," funded by the Allyn Family Foundation and KeyBank. This one year position is an opportunity for developers from underrepresented backgrounds to learn more about major construction and redevelopment projects and then use that knowledge to advance their own business or support others.

CenterState CEO Task Force Recommends Policies to Meet Housing Challenge


Since Micron Technology announced its plan to invest \$100 billion in Central New York to build four new chip megafabs, CenterState CEO recognized the need to address the area's housing challenges now. Often, cities don't have the advantage of planning for exponential growth until they're in it. However, Central New York has an opportunity to try to meet the region's significant demand for housing without creating unsustainable, inequitable conditions that often result from significant economic investment.

CenterState CEO convened a Housing Task Force in summer 2023 to examine the interrelated challenges of low supply, increasing costs, regulatory restrictions, and limited capital availability, and make policy recommendations on solutions that can be implemented in the context of current laws and economic conditions, while maintaining equity as a core tenant. The Housing Task Force includes a range of stakeholders, such as developers, housing advocates, nonprofits leaders and representatives from financial institutions.

DATA FINDINGS:

Among the data impacting the challenges and opportunities related to the current and future demand in the housing market, as well as policy landscape:

- Micron Technology's investment alone is expected to create more than 76,000 new residents in the region by 2055.
- In Onondaga County, only 3% of all residential zoned land, and only 1% of such land outside of the city of Syracuse, is currently zoned for multi-family residential development.
- The private sector is eager to accommodate demand. CenterState CEO is tracking nearly \$3 billion in proposed housing development projects totaling nearly 9,000 units.
- More than 50% of the region's renters are paying more than 30% of their household income for housing; rents have increased by 57% over the past seven years.
- 2,500 new units of housing are needed each year to meet growing demand, more than six times the current pace of development (currently 350 unites per year).



Following several months of discussion and study, CenterState CEO's Housing Tasking Force offered four central policy recommendations:

1. GETTING TO "YES" IN OUR BACKYARD

Missing middle housing—a range of multi-unit or clustered housing types—is strongly supported by the market and community due to affordability, quality, size, and attractiveness. To get more of this in-demand housing to the market, municipalities, developers and builders must be brought together and supported so that needless and costly regulations are eased, and proposed designs match the desires and vision of the community.

2. GET CLARITY ON CHANGING MARKETS

CenterState CEO welcomes and supports the critical ongoing and forthcoming housing strategies and analyses in Central New York from the City of Syracuse, Onondaga County, and a regional study from Empire State Development. To support missing middle housing development, local markets will need feasibility studies to understand the impacts of zoning and landuse changes and the ongoing population and demographic shifts driven by new employment in the region.

3. DEVELOP TOOLS TO INCREASE THE AVAILABILITY OF CAPITAL

The intricate challenge of financing the construction or rehabilitation of missing middle housing aligns well with the expertise of Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFIs). Therefore, a pivotal strategy component should involve promoting and building CDFI capacity, which could address challenges, particularly within the 80-120% of the Area Median Income range.

4. BUILD COMMUNITY STRENGTH

Advocating for a healthy housing market includes supporting housing for a diverse mix of incomes and socio-economic backgrounds. Supply-driven solutions such as missing middle housing, are generally helpful in addressing affordability. However, specific initiatives are also needed that build community strength and support shared prosperity in communities. This includes providing new and additional funding to address growing homelessness in Central New York and additional funding to enhance existing transit, support housing near transit, and other transit-oriented development.




